








EYFS Maths Home Learning Activities 18.5.20-22.5.20

Home learning	<p>We are learning:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> To copy, continue and create repeating patterns e.g. red, blue, red, blue, red, blue

	<p>Watch Numberblocks - "Pattern Palace" Season 3 Episode 17 (available on YouTube https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=U_EFzinbA8)</p>  <p>Talk about the "pattern" each time. Can you predict the next part of the pattern? Get creative and use colours to make lots of patterns. Here's one made out of Skittles!</p> 	<p>Make patterns using your body e.g. stamp, hop, stamp, hop, stamp, hop</p>  <p>Say the pattern aloud so that children can hear the rhythm of the pattern.</p> <p>Try a 3 part sequence to make it trickier e.g. clap, pat head, pat knees; clap, pat head, pat knees etc.</p>	<p>Use pattern as a way of practising 2D (flat) shapes. This is a good way to practise shape names and talk about properties of shapes (e.g. sides, corners, straight, curved...) You could draw or colour the shape patterns - like this.</p>  <p>Or you could make your own shapes using loose parts e.g. pencils, cotton buds or lollipop sticks. Have a look at the example below using lollipop sticks.</p> 	<p>https://www.topmarks.co.uk/ordering-and-sequencing/shape-patterns</p> <p>Follow the link to play a pattern game. If you can't use a computer why not make up your own pattern game. You could use toy or objects around the house. These ones have been created using Lego!</p> 	<p><i>I can continue a pattern.</i></p>  <p>Draw or make the start of a pattern. Encourage your child to talk about the pattern and then have a go at completing it!</p>
