Apologies for the problems any of you may have encountered with Rising Stars this week. The 'Sharing' option had been turned off so tasks you could see before were now all hidden! Thankfully it is sorted now and you should be able to continue to work your way through the tasks I have set. Remember too that you have some tasks set on Active Learn Primary and as far as I can see, nobody has finished these yet.

I hope you're all getting on well with the maths I have set on My Maths and Education City. The focus is shape. If you'd been in school, I would have been teaching you the following:

Draw 2-D shapes and make 3-D shapes using modelling materials; recognise 3-D shapes in different orientations and describe them
 You could use play-dough to make some 3D shapes. You could draw a picture made of different 2D shapes.

- Identify horizontal and vertical lines and pairs of perpendicular and parallel lines. You could draw a picture of the front of your house, labelling all the different types of lines you have used.
- Recognise angles as a property of shape or a description of a turn. You could ask someone to give you instructions, eg. 'Turn 3 right angles clockwise'.
- Identify right angles and identify whether other angles are greater or less than a right angle. You could make a right-angle eater to find right angles in your home
- Recognise that two right angles make a half turn, three make three quarters of a turn and four a complete turn.

To help you with this there are 15 lessons on the Oak Academy website. This is a website that the government set up to assist with Home Learning and although I have heard mixed reports about its use, I do think the shape sections are worth taking a good look at: https://www.thenational.academy/online-classroom/year-3/maths#
Scroll down to the Angles and Shape section and everything you need is there.
